An Archivist's Guide to Preserving Your Family Archives

Presented by Sierra Green

Sierra Green, an archivist from the Heinz History Center's Detre Library & Archives, will provide tips and guidance on preserving your family archives. Hands-on activities will illustrate real-world examples on approaches to preserving the original records and genealogical research files that help tell your family's story. Workshop activities will guide visitors through identification, organization, and storage of records to ensure proper care for materials now and for future generations.

Solving Problems with Original Records

Using case studies, this session will illustrate nine categories of records with skimpy microfilm coverage, explain three reasons genealogical researchers need original sources, and demonstrate strategies that attendees can use for locating original records and applying them to their family histories.

Missing Something? Getting the Most out of Genealogical Evidence

Attendees will learn five ways to get more information from the genealogical sources they use: paying attention to all of the evidence in the sources; examining each source's context; using an entire series; paying better attention to what is not in the source (using negative evidence); and combining sources to build a case.

A case study set in the early 1800s demonstrates methodology for using autosomal DNA test results to help solve longstanding genealogical problems.




