VETERAN ADMINISTRATION BURIAL RECORDS ONLINE

The Veterans Administration has put on-line 3.2 million records of veterans buried at 120 national cemeteries since the Civil War. There are also records of some state veterans' cemeteries and burials at Arlington National Cemetery since 1999. The 'gravesite locator' is found at http://www.cem.va.gov and is free of charge.

The locator includes names, dates of birth and death, military service dates, service branch and rank if known, cemetery information and grave location in cemetery. The site is updated daily with about 80,000 annual burials at national cemeteries.

(Ed: I understand that since this was announced the site has been very busy and takes quite a while to load. You may want to wait or try off-hours to access these records.)

COLONIAL COMEBACK

A new series airing this springo n PBS applies the hot concept of reality television to early American history. You will see some of the less-refined, little-known elements of Colonial life: indentured sertitude, backbreaking labor, public punishment and rigid gender roles.

Colonial House, which permiers May 17 at 8 pm EST, recreates a typical 1628 colonial village. The village's 26 inhabitants, chosen from more than 5,000 applications, received training in Colonial life before sailing to their New World destination on a period tall ship. They lived in single-story cottages measuring 15x20 feet each and struggles to create a functioning colony using the tools of the era. Check out:

THE GENEALOGY OF MODERN MAN According to DNA Analysis Tom Wiley

Several years ago, geneticist Dr. Spencer Wells helped develop and hosted the PBS documentary, "Journey of Man: The Story of the Human Species." At the same time he began writing a companion book that he titled, "The Journey of Man: A Genetic Odyssey." In the book, published in 2002, he was able to include greater scientific detail than was possible for television.

The thesis of his book is that our genetic code can answer the question of who were the people that came before our known and written genealogical records. Where did they live? What were they like?

He uses the results of recent Y-DNA research that he and many world-renown geneticists have conducted to conclude that "modern man", the six billion people that populate the earth today, originated in Africa about 50,000 years ago. He does not say that this is where and when the human species originated. Only that Y-DNA analysis indicates that the human race, as we know it today, originated in Africa about 2,000 generations ago.

By correlating language development with DNA analysis, Dr. Wells concludes that the French and German that we know today as national languages came into use about 1850, or about six generations ago. He also relates the results of archaeological findings and carbon dating of artifacts to DNA analysis.

Perhaps one of Dr. Wells' most intriguing conclusions is that DNA analysis of people of all races, from all geographic locations, of all skin colors and facial characteristics, show greater variation within these groups than between them. In other words, according to our genetic make-up, as human beings, we have more in

common than we have differences

NHG MAY 18 MEETING USING RELATIONSHIPS TO ESTABLISH ORIGINS

The presenter will be Rich Hayden, who previously spoke to NHG two years ago on the topic "I have 20 years of stuff, now what do I do with it?" In this presentation, Rich will draw on his recently published article in the NGS Quarterly in which he explores what to do when direct evidence of ancestry is elusive. He suggests that expanding the search beyond isolated individuals can be productive and, from the resulting body of information, the genealogist may be able to deduce enough from indirect evidence to build a case proving a relationship. Rich uses Casper and Catherine Hoover of Pennsylvania and Maryland to explore this thesis.

Ed: I know I have some lines where finding the "proof" seems to be impossible. I'm looking forward to hearing Rich's suggestions and hopefully find a way around some of those brickwalls.

The hotel is about two blocks from the newly renovated National Archives. Also within walking distance are the White House and the DAR Library. The Library of Congress can be reached by a long walk, cab or metro.

The cost for a person rooming alone is \$375; for each person in a double is \$240; for each person in a triple is \$200 and for each person in a quad is \$175. You may take \$5 off of these published prices if paying in full by April 30, 2004. Full refunds are available if requested before August 15, 2004. Attendees do not have to be a North Hills Genealogists member and on-genealogical hotel companions are welcome, provided seats are available. For those of you familiar with NARA, Paula Wiegand reports: "Everything that was on the 4th floor is now on the ground floor. The library from the 2nd floor is also on the ground floor. The document reading room and bulk copying rooms are still on the 2nd floor, but the bulk copying room has moved to the opposite end of the building. The cafeteria is still in the basement, but it too has moved. As for procedure, military records are ordered on the ground floor and viewed on the 2nd floor."

250th ANNIVERSARY OF THE FRENCH AND INDIAN WAR

The French and Indian War was a conflict primarily between arch enemies France and Great Britain that spanned the globe. Sometimes called the first world war, it began 250 years ago in Pittsburgh. The French and British were fighting over control of territory west of the Allegheny Mountains. Significant events include:

1754

April 18 - The British surrender Ft. Prince George at present-day Point State Park to the French. The French began building Ft. Duquesne.

May 28 - George Washington, 22, a member of the British military, leads 40 men from present-day Uniontown where about 10 Indian warriors joined them to confront the French. Among the slain is French commander, Ensign deJumonville. The 15 minute skirmish is considered the first battle of the yet-undeclared war.

May 30 - Washington builds Ft. Necessity, about 11 miles east of Uniontown.

July 3 - The French and their Indian allies attack Washington at Ft. Necessity as retribution for the death of Jumonville. Washington surrendered and retreated on July 4.

1755

July 9 - The British send Maj. Gen. Edward Braddock and 1300 troops to Ft. Duquesne. They are attacked by about 900 French and American Indian troops at present-day Braddock. Braddock suffered more than 1,000 casualties over three hours and died July 14 near Jumonville.

1756

May 17 - The British formally declare war on the French. Fighting spreads to Europe, the West Indies and India.

Sept. 9 - PA Col. John Armstrong launches an attack on the Lenape Indians, destroying the village of Kittanning, the only British success of the year.

1757

Aug 9-10 - French capture Ft. William Henry at Lake George, NY but deny Indian allies any plunder. Angry Indians capture and kill hundreds of British and vowed not to fight with the French any longer.

1758

Sept. 3 - British Gen. John Forbes ordered to recapture Ft. Duquesne, constructs Ft. Ligonier as a staging area.

Oct. 12 - French forces from Ft. Duquesne unsuccessfully attack Ft. Ligioner.

Nov. 23 - Forbes launches his assault on Ft. Duquesne. The French set fire to the fort and retreat. The British seize the fort, name the site Pittsburgh. The next spring the British start construction of Ft. Pitt.

1759

July 10-26 - French surrender Ft. Niagra, Ft. Ticonderoga and Crown Point, NY, clearing the way to the St. Lawrence River and Quebec.

Sept. 13 - French surrender Quebec.

1760

Sept. 8 - British capture Montreal. Fighting between British and French in North America ends.

1761 - Fall

British Cmdr. Amherst restricts trade with the American Indians, causing hardship for them.

1762

June 8-Aug. 13 - British capture Havana, Cuba, bringing Spain into the war. (cont on page 78)

FRENCH & INDIAN WAR (cont)

1763 -

Feb. 10 - Spain, France and Britain sign the Treaty of Paris, ending hostilities between the nations and dividing control of North America.

April 27-June 21 - American Indians, angry over British trading policies, revolt. Pontiac's War begins and soon forts Detroit and Pitt are under seige.

Aug 5-6 - Col. Henry Bouquet attempts to relieve Ft. Pitt but American Indians attack him at Bushy Run, now Jeanette. Bouquets tricks the Indians, driving them off.

1765 -

Fall - The British change their trade policies and American Indians make peace, ending Pontiac's War.

Reynolds Papers includes the letters and photographs of Catp. Tilton C. Reynolds, a member of the 105th Regiment of Pennsylvania Volunteers.
