Come to think about it, organizing a family reunion for this purpose might also be a good project. NEWLY DIGITIZED COLLECTION ADDED TO PA PHOTOS AND DOCUMENTS

The "New Castle Directories, 1872-1921 Collection" is now available on the POWER Library: PA Photos and Documents. This digitized collection from the New Castle Public Library will enhance access to a collection that is already utilized by thousands of users around the world who conduct genealogy research. Making this collection available online will enhance users ability to locate specific names, street, and businesses since the volumes will be made fulltext searchable, 24/7. Digitization will increase the use of these early New Castle City, Lawrence County, and regional directories from 1872 to 1921 while preserving the original volumes, which are in poor condition.

POWER LIBRARY: PENNSYLVANIA'S DIGITAL LIBRARY

POWER Library, the digital library for all of Pennsylvania's public and school libraries, is back with a full menu of databases and collections, after a four-year period of time when budget cuts in the state had decimated the collection. *POWER Library* is free and accessible to all Pennsylvania residents; to explore the vast holdings, you must enter through your local library's web page or have a direct link, such as the one in the article above about the New Castle (Pennsylvania) Directories.

This digital database is full of valuable resources for genealogists with Pennsylvania roots. In addition to the *PA Photos and Documents* database, some others of interest include *AP Images* and *EBSCOhost*, a searchable database of historic and current newspapers, magazines, and journals, and many digitized e-books that may otherwise be out of print. Note—each database is a separate link on the *POWER Library* menu, and therefore, each database must be searched separately. The upgrade of *POWER Library* by the PA Department of Education last fall has greatly enhanced access to millions of valuable resources.

Pennsylvania residents—Go to your local library's website and click on the POWER Library link. To find the website of your local library, go to <u>Pennsylvania Public Libraries on the Web</u>. Northland Public Library has a link with the name "Access PA Power Library" on the main page of their website (<u>http://northlandlibrary.weebly.com</u>).

Instructions for using POWER Library

- 1. If requested, type in your library card number. If you do not have a library card or the number is not working, please contact your local library.
- 2. Databases are arranged by subjects. Click on a database of your choice.
- 3. Type in your search term(s) and scroll down the page to select additional search options. TIP: Clicking 'full text', searching for related words, or searching within the full text of the article will improve your search on most databases. Enclosing a string of words within quotation marks will search for items with that exact phrase.
- 4. Click the search button, click go or press enter to start your search.
- 5. Some databases may ask you to select additional options.

Results may be read online, printed, emailed, or saved to a storage device! New items are added to the various databases on *POWER Library* each month or as they become available. The more that Pennsylvanians access and utilize *POWER Library*, the better the chance that this collection of digital databases will grow.

GENEALOGY STANDARDS UPDATED IN NEW MANUAL

In honor of its fiftieth anniversary, the Board for

Certification of Genealogists® ("BCG") has issued *Genealogy Standards*, a manual for best practices in research and assembly of accurate family histories. This revision completely updates and reorganizes the original 2000 edition of *The BCG Genealogical Standards Manual*.

"Accuracy is fundamental to genealogical research," writes editor Thomas W. Jones, Ph.D., CG, CGL, in the introduction. "Without it, a family's history would be fiction. This manual presents the standards family historians use to obtain valid results. These standards apply to all genealogical research, whether shared privately or published."

The 83 specific standards cover the process of researching family history and the finished products of the research. Based on the five-part Genealogical Proof Standard, the standards cover:

- documenting (standards 1–8);
- researching (standards 9–50), including planning, collecting, and reasoning from evidence;
- writing (standards 51–73), including proofs, assembly, and special products;
- teaching and lecturing (standards 74–81); and
- continuing education (standards 82 & 83).

The 100-page book includes appendices: the genealogist's code, a description of BCG and its work, a list of sources and resources where examples of work that meets standards are regularly published, a glossary, and an evidence-process map distinguishing the three kinds of sources, information, and evidence.

"We are delighted to provide this new edition, which is meant for all genealogical researchers and practitioners as a way to recognize sound genealogy," said BCG president Elissa Scalise Powell, CG, CGL. "We appreciate the many hands that helped bring this new edition to fruition and look forward to its widespread usage in the field."

TRENDING NOW IN GENEALOGY: THE WINTER OLYMPICS AS A CATALYST FOR DOCUMENTING ATHLETIC ACHIEVEMENTS

In 2014, many genealogists plan to focus on the New Year's resolution of writing up family stories and anecdotes or writing up findings about ancestors. Getting started with the first thought or main idea is often the blockade to writing. Instead of setting aside such an important task, choose a topic to help to focus your written stories.

Current events can often reveal topics for a chapter to add to one's family history, so with that in mind . . . "Let the Games Begin!"

The Sochi 2014 Winter Olympic Games open on February 6th, and in addition to the coverage of Olympic competition, the cultural and historical coverage of Russia will be valuable as well. In addition to the television coverage, two of the most reliable websites for the upcoming Games are the official Sochi 2014 Winter Olympics site, www.sochi2014.com/en and the official site of the Olympic Games sponsored bv the International Olympic Committee (IOC), www.olympics.org.

The connections to genealogy? Here are some suggestions:

- Use the Olympic Games as a reminder to document and preserve the athletic achievements in your family. Perhaps there are no Olympians, but there are surely many accomplishments to record. Use scrapbooks, yearbooks, and newspaper clippings to compile the story of each athlete in your family. Interview the family athletes as well as those family members who watched and encouraged them from the stands.
- Cluster genealogy did anyone in your family know an Olympian? Play with a future Olympian? Live near an Olympian? A great example is Suzie McConnell-Serio, a native of Pittsburgh from a large family, and a former Olympic basketball player with a gold

medal from the 1988 Games and a bronze medal from the 1992 Games. Suzie has coached girls' basketball in Pittsburgh since 1991. You might know her.

- Memories of the Olympic Games many athletes watch the Olympic Games and have memories of sitting around a TV with family and viewing history live-not just the Olympic achievements, but the compromises celebrations or that reflected history at that time. Perhaps someone in the family has attended the Olympic Games. For example, I served as a volunteer and security guard for six weeks at the 1996 Centennial Summer Olympics in Atlanta, and I also had the privilege of attending the 2002 Winter Olympic Games in Salt Lake City, as well as a week of the London 2012 Summer Olympics. Write up the experience!
- The Cultural Olympic Festival do you have Russian or Eastern European roots? If so, then during Sochi 2014, watch for features, articles, and web links related to the Cultural Olympics: when original music, literature, and art from the host country are presented to the world. Also, the Opening Ceremony is traditionally a celebration of the history and culture of the host country, with a focus on the people and their lives throughout time. Talk about a crash course about your Russian roots—the Opening Ceremony will showcase Russia!
- Inspirational stories the myriad of features about athletes and their country can spark a memory for you to write about inspiring ancestors from your own family stories.

The Olympic Games are televised sports at their finest, with the advantage of detailed presentations about Sochi, Russia, and celebrating one's heritage and culture. The music and pageantry will demonstrate pride in one's country in a sportsmanlike atmosphere of competition.

Let the Sochi 2014 Winter Olympic Games inspire your genealogical writing as you preserve the achievements of the athletes and sports fans in your family.
