PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Happy Spring, fellow North Hills Genealogists!

I hope your 2018 research is going well, and that vou enjoyed our recent annual conference. I am always amazed at what a superb job our Conference Committee does, chaired by Amy Arner. Thanks to Amy and the entire Conference organizing such Committee for a great conference! We look forward to Sharon Thornber's leadership as 2019 Conference Co-Chair.

We're happy to share with you our new and improved Policies & Procedures and the proposed changes to our NHG Bylaws later this month. The membership will be voting on the Bylaws in June. (More information about that process later.)

I did some fascinating research at the Heinz History Center's Detre Library & Archives a few weeks ago, and wanted to share my discoveries. I think you might find them useful in your research.

My goal was to determine the differences between the City of Pittsburgh marriage returns held by the Detre Library & Archives and the county-level marriage records held by the Allegheny County Marriage License Bureau. I noted several differences in the information contained between the various record sets; while they generally contained similar information, the level of detail within the Pittsburgh marriage returns, specifically regarding place of origin, pleasantly surprised me!

Pittsburgh city marriage returns exist from 1875 to 1909, and these records are available at the Heinz History Center (MSS 458). These are Minister's Returns for marriages that occurred within the city limits. The phrase "Minister's returns" is a misnomer, as they actually also include returns from rabbis, aldermen, justices of the peace, etc. The same records are also available on microfilm at the University of Pittsburgh's Archives & Special Collections (http://digital2.library.pitt.edu/islandora/object/pitt%3AUS-PPiU-ais197910/viewer). Additionally, these same records are also available on FamilySearch.org (www.familysearch.org/search/catalog/257622), although you will need to ac-

cess them at a Family History Center or a FamilySearch affiliate library.

As an example, let me introduce you to Samuel Cohen and Bella Goldenson. They married 25 December 1892 at the Schaarch Torah Synagogue in Pittsburgh. Because this marriage occurred within the city limits, a city marriage return was filed. This city marriage return (obtained at the Heinz History Center) specified the exact address and place of foreign origin of both bride and groom, as well as their ages and the occupation of the groom.

The county marriage record (obtained downtown at the Marriage License Bureau) for the same marriage only included a country of origin for both spouses, though it did include an exact date of birth for both individuals. The groom's occupation and address was listed (though the address did not match the address on the city return). No exact address was listed for the bride.

A *third* marriage record exists in the form of a marriage license docket, which is available via *FamilySearch* (www.familysearch.org/search/catalog/248617). (These records appear to exist for marriages within Allegheny County from 1885 to 1905.) This is different from the county marriage license obtained downtown, though it included nearly identical information.

A *fourth* record of the marriage should exist in the form of the synagogue's records. I have not reached out to the synagogue to determine how the information on their records might differ or provide further details on this couple.

In addition, remember a resource that Aaron McWilliams, Reference Archivist at the Pennsylvania State Archives, specified in one of his lectures during our annual conference. *Another* set of the county-level marriage records exist for marriages that occurred between 1885 and 1891, so if Samuel and Bella had married one year earlier, there could have been a *fifth* record of the same marriage. According to Aaron, the records should be identical to the records on file in the county courthouse, but we all know that human error sometimes comes into play.

Thus, with pulling together the information from these three different sources, we learn exact birth dates for both bride and groom, their town of birth overseas, their exact addresses in Pittsburgh, and the occupation of the groom. We only can see such a complete picture when correlating the information from *all* of the sources rather than from just one source.

Keep these ideas in mind as you research—remember that there are sometimes differences in records that all document the same event. If a town, county, and state copy all exist, it is worth examining every one of those documents. If your research goal was to determine the place of origin of Samuel and Bella, but you only obtained the two county-level records (the license and the license docket), your research goal would remain unfulfilled. However, just by adding that third record to the mix, the answers sought materialize.

Remember that county marriage licenses start in 1885, but these city returns start in 1875. There are also separate City of Pittsburgh marriage returns from 1870-1879 that are on microfiche downtown (and indexed in published volumes at the Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh). As such, while Allegheny County marriage records do not start until 1885, marriages that occurred in the City of Pittsburgh can be found as early as 1870.

UPDATED RESOURCE OFFERED ONLINE BY PENN STATE

During the past year, some of the historic collections from the Pennsylvania State University's Libraries have been digitized to better preserve the records and for increased accessibility for interested individuals. Housed through Penn State's online libraries, there are two collections of significance. The first, Penn State Digital Collections, was created by digitizing a large portion of the Special Collections holdings. Items about Pennsylvania's history, geography, geology, agriculture, labor, and Civil War can be found online, fully indexed, at: https://libraries.psu.edu/collections/browseaz/all. The second database, Pennsylvania Newspaper Archive, is part of the nation's digital newspaper project and has indexed and preserved newspapers from across the Commonwealth. This collection is found online at: panewsarchive.psu.edu. These new, digital resources may be used to help genealogists with researching their family history.

ACCESS TO NEW YORK CITY VITAL RECORDS RESTRICTED

New York City's Department of Health and Mental Hygiene recently passed a rule restricting public access to birth and death records. Birth records are now restricted for 125 years. Death records are now restricted for 75 years.

DETRE LIBRARY & ARCHIVES ACQUIRES ALLEGHENY COUNTY RECORDS

The Heinz History Center's Detre Library & Archives recently acquired two sets of records from Allegheny County.

The first record set is the Veterans and Widows Burial and Death Records. The finding aid for these records states that these "document burial applications and arrangements for honorably discharged military veterans and their widows who resided in Allegheny County, PA. The records consist of 114 bound volumes ranging from 1885–1995 and detail veteran's burial allowances, funeral costs, soldier and widow information, military service and family information." These records are in MSS 1159.

The second record set is Election Dockets 1860–1940. These list local elections, including the names of the candidates and the number of votes they received. This collection has not been processed yet. If you would like to use these records, ask the staff at the desk.

SPOTLIGHT ON LOCAL REPOSITORIES: BEAVER COUNTY GENEALOGY & HISTORY CENTER

The Beaver County Genealogy and History Center is a local repository that offers a wealth of records with support from friendly, knowledgeable volunteers. If you have ancestors who lived in Beaver County or adjacent areas, this is a place you must visit for your genealogical research.

Housed in a former 911 call center, the facility was obtained by the Beaver County Historical Society who partnered with the local genealogy group to create an archive of local records and to offer classes. The many record groups available for researchers include complete sets of yearbooks for many Beaver County high schools, along with partial yearbook collections for the other schools. There is also an extensive collection of obituaries obtained from local funeral homes and local newspapers such as *The Beaver County Times*.

The center's collection also includes Beaver County documents about births and marriages, but some years are not available, and some sets are incomplete. The cemeteries of Beaver County have been cataloged, and data and records include a variety of resources, especially the actual records of cemetery caretakers.

Two other valuable record groups that may be accessed at the center are Beaver County property tax records and land deeds to 1860. Tax records from the nineteenth century often include a listing of items owned by the family and sometimes include basic information about the family members. Deeds may delineate actual property boundaries, list adjoining properties and owners, and include names of grantor and grantee. All of this information might add a detail to your genealogical research to distinguish one family from another.

Books relating directly to Beaver County people, families, history, and places are available for sale in the Beaver County Genealogy and History Center. The same books are included in the center's library of historical and genealogical books that may be accessed while visiting the center. (This is not a lending library.)

Of the available public and private records in this repository, there are a significant number of family histories that have been donated and indexed. The quickest way to access these items is by enlisting the aid of one of the center's volunteers. There are always multiple volunteers around to offer support and to explain what resources are within their collection and how to access those records.

Volunteers at the Beaver County Genealogy and

History Center offer professional research services for individuals or families. You can email an inquiry to research @beavercountyhistory.org to ask for a quote based upon your query. If you are a member of BCG&HC, then the research fees are waived. Please refer to the website for the most up-to-date information.

The Beaver County Genealogy and History Center is located at 250 East End Avenue, Beaver, PA 15009 in a former bunker that was renovated to accommodate researchers. It is adjacent to the Beaver Train Station, but the entrance to the genealogy and history center is to the left of the train station. There is a detailed map showing how to enter the center found on their website at the bottom of the page: www.beavercountyhistory.org.

Current hours were recently extended; from April 1 to November 30, the Beaver County Genealogy and History Center is open and manned by volunteers on Tuesday through Saturday from 10:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. Parking is free.

BOOK REVIEW: THE LOST GERMAN SLAVE GIRL: THE EXTRAORDINARY TRUE STORY OF SALLY MILLER AND HER FIGHT FOR FREEDOM IN OLD NEW ORLEANS

John Bailey's book details the true story of a young slave woman believed to be an orphaned German immigrant who goes to court in 1844 to be recognized as a free white woman. In the spring of 1817, seven families (forty people) went on a harrowing journey from Langensoultzbach, Alsace, to America. During their trip, they endured bad weather, thieving ships' agents, too many refugees in Amsterdam, and an unscrupulous ship owner who forced people to "repay" their passage by working as servants to once they arrived in America.

Additional information on Redemptioners, the court system, and the prevailing attitudes towards slaves and the rights of slave owners in New Orleans during the early part of the nineteenth century is fascinating. An unexpected twist in the story keeps the reader engaged until

the end. The book is available in the Allegheny County public library system.
