

LOST AND FOUND

A dowry chest was found in the North Hills Antique Gallery, Church Road and Rt.19, Wexford, PA 15090 Phone:412-935-9804. The dowry chest has the inscription "Friederica Bohnsak 1843" on its front. The accompanying card says that Friederica Bohnsak was a German immigrant of 1845. This was her dowry chest, made by her father Adolph Bohnsak. She married Horst Schuller and they came to the United States and soon after settled in Butler County. The chest is approximately 5 feet long by 2 feet wide by 40 inches high and is for sale for \$1,995.

QUERIES

Q: Where was "London on the Blue" in Mercer County, PA in 1844? My PHENICE/PHENICIE ancestors came from there. -- Bette Fulkerson, Member # 91005

A: It is most likely the village of London in Springfield Township which is partly located on land that was first owned by Adam Black. A post office was established there in 1848; David Gisbon was the first Postmaster. He also chose the name for the Post Office. Adam Black was a pioneer who settled in Springfield Township in 1805.

Q: Can anyone tell me what the "Triumph Circle No. 101 P.H.C." is or was? It was mentioned in three obituaries. --Virginia Lewis, Member # 91036

A: After checking through the Carnegie Library list of professional organizations and finding no reference to the above, it appears that this is a fraternal or social organization. Unfortunately there are no lists of these at the Carnegie. Can any of our members help on this one!

PERSONAL ANCESTRAL FILE (PAF) UTILITIES

- Extracted from the latest bulletin of the Computer Interest group of the Genealogical Society of South Africa by Steph Valentine. Questions can be directed to Mr. Valentine, Member # 91018.

FAMILY RECORDS UTILITIES (FRU16.ZIP): This is a very useful utility program for PAF, and it reads PAF files directly. It has menus that look the same as those in PAF, and a configuration program that works in the same way. Its main job is to produce a more and different kinds of reports. It will also let you make changes to the names and places throughout your database and convert your database to other formats for use by other programs. Some of the reports it can print are: birthday lists, lists of un-connected individuals, an index of all data with RINw and MRINs, family group records with six children on the first page instead of four, Ahnentafel charts with places as well as dates, and the marriage date and place for males. Note reports for all families or individuals, and lists using tagged notes. Tagged notes such as address lists, occupation lists, telephone lit and source lists. It will print demographic statistics such as the average age at marriage and the average age at death of the people in your database. You can change all names to upper case or lower case. You can change names to have a standard spelling. It will let you view and edit families in a family group record format. Finally, it lets you export the data from your files in ASCII, so that you can import them into other programs, like dBase, Paradox or PC File. This is a truly excellent program, and one which no PAF user should be without!

FAMILY TREE PRINT (PAFP21.ZIP): This program actually comes in two versions - one for Family Ties and one for PAF. The PAF version is FTP21 and the Family Ties version is FTP119. I only got the PAF version, but the manual describes the Family Tie version, which has the important utility of a GEDCOM program to get your data out of Family Ties. If you are a Family Ties user who wants to escape, you can send \$27.50 for either version, or \$42.50 for both to: Common Sense Software, 2068 Trailwood Drive, Cincinnati, OH 45230.

Now for what it does. It draws family tree charts. Proper draw-line trees, with each name in a box and connecting lines. It prints a border with grid numbers like a map, and a complete index, so you can see that Aunt Hettie is at row 10 column 23. This program is good. It's not too happy about cross cousin marriages, which cause crossed lines, but apparently the authors are working on a new version that will cope with that as well. It will also do three generation printouts, ancestor and descendant wall charts and more. It is

supposed to be able to prune trees so you don't have to print everyone, but the instructions in the manual aren't very clear. I'm sure it works, but, I'm probably too thick. I hit an easier work-around. I used my Family History System (FHS) relative select program to choose part of a tree, exported it to new PAF through GEDCOM, and printed a tree from that.

FAMILY GROUP CARD (FGC.ZIP): Have you heard people saying things like "Now that we have computers, the age of the card index in dead" - and felt a little bit uneasy about the prospect? If so, I don't blame you. No, computers don't replace card indexes, they just make it a lot easier to keep them up to date. FGC prints family group sheets from PAF files on 6x4 cards. You can spread 25 of them over your desk to check on information while you're entering new data. Just try doing that with Windows! When you enter new data, you can print another card. This is the program that make PAF worth buying!

PRINT CARD (PRNTCARD.ZIP): Similar to the previous program, only it prints 3x5 cards, and as a bonus exports your data to .DBF files used by dBase, Clipper and several other database programs.

PAFAIDE (PAFAIDE.ZIP): This program also does some more fancy reports than PAF. Most are similar to the ones mentioned above. The most interesting one is a lifeline graph that shows when the people in your records lived, so you can see at a glance who was contemporary with whom.

FOREST (FOREST.ZIP): Forest will show you how many separate family trees you have in your database - useful if you've imported data from another program (via GEDCOM) and haven't linked it up properly to the existing records.

GENEALOGICAL INDEX PROCESSING SYSTEM & INTERPRETER (GIPSI.ZIP): This one is somewhat different. It doesn't get data out of PAF - it puts it in. The Family History Library in Salt Lake City offer computer terminals for the public to use. This lets you browse through the International Genealogical Index (IGI) on compact disk (CD-ROM). You can capture selected records in GEDCOM or ASCII format. GIPSI will turn the captured data into .DBF files for dBase, comma-delimited ASCII for other programs to use, and will also import the records directly into the Research Data Filer of PAF.

THE READERS' CORNER by Robin Schooley

Computer Genealogy. That is the topic of this month's program and newsletter...two very scary words being used together. Ten months ago I was totally computer illiterate. Today I use my PC to store records on hundreds of ancestors. While I am by no means an expert, I'd like to share with our readers a few things that have helped me along the way.

Some of the better "How-to" books such as THE SOURCE and the RESEARCHER'S GUIDE TO AMERICAN GENE-ALOGY include chapters on genealogical computing, and offer suggestions for further reading. A look at these chapters are well worth your time.

A book that has just recently come to my attention is the newly revised edition (1991) of COMPUTER GENEALOGY edited by Richard A. Pence. It is published by Ancestry, Inc., P.O. Box 476, Salt Lake City, UT 84110, and is available through them for about \$12,95. Some of the chapters have appeared in slightly different form in GENEALOGICAL COMPUTING, a quarterly publication also by Ancestry, Inc. (Subscriptions-\$25/year toll free #1-800-531-1790), which is another good source of information for computer-using genealogists at all levels.

COMPUTER GENEALOGY is a great book for beginners who have a fear of computers. It takes the technical explanations associated with computers and simplifies them so that you can make the computer work for you. The first section is on hardware. If you don't already have a computer, but are contemplating getting one, this section is extremely helpful. If you already own a computer, this section can give you a better understanding of it.

The section of software is helpful to the beginner, but the book also includes advanced topics for the more experienced computer user as well. Finally, there are appendices on the four of the most widely used genealogical programs and related software: PAF, Roots III, Family Roots, and Everyone's Family Tree.

Of the four above mentioned programs, I personally have chosen to use PAF, or the Personal Ancestral File, a program that was developed and is supported and sold by the Family History Department of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. I originally based my decision to use this program on the recommendation of others as well as on the price. The program, or actually series of programs still sells for about \$35. As a computer novice I did not want to invest a lot of money in software that I might not be able to use. So far I have been very pleased. The print-outs may not be as "pretty" as some other programs, but for my purposes they are fine. PAF can be ordered from the Salt Lake Distribution

Center, 1999 West 1700 South, Salt Lake City, UT 84104 (801) 240-2584.

According to the July-August-September 1991 issue of the GENEALOGICAL COMPUTING, the top rated genealogical software is Roots III by Comsoft. Although I've seen it advertised for less, the program retails for \$250. However, there are additional support programs such as GEDCOM and Roots Writer that you may want to add, which could cost you as much as an additional \$100. In all honesty I have to say that since I have never used the program I cannot evaluate its merits. Maybe I don't know enough about computers to fully appreciate it. But as a beginner, I would leave this one to the experts. If you are interested, a demo of this program is available for \$10. Contact Comsoft, Inc., 7795 Bell Road, P.O. Quinsept, Inc. puts out a variety of genealogical software including Family Roots, Lineages, and Family Connections. Prices and capabilities of these programs vary, so I would suggest giving them a call at 1-800-637-ROOTS for free brochures and sample printouts. Programmers are also available at that number to answer any technical questions you may have. Their address is Quinsept, Inc., P.O. Box 216, Lexington, MA 02173.

Everyone's Family Tree is genealogical software for IBM compatibles by the Dollarhide Systems, 203 W. Holly St., Suite M4, Bellingham, WA 98225. This software was designed with the help of William Dollarhide, a highly respected genealogists. It is supposed to be easy to install and easy to use. The full program retails for \$169, but a free demo is available. The advertising on this one looks pretty enticing. In fact, if you are currently using PAF, Dollarhide Systems will deduct \$35 from the price of the program if you send them an original page from the PAF User's Manual. If you are currently using PAF and think you might want to upgrade, taking a look at the free demo might be well worth your time. Why not send for it? I have.

The title of this column is the Reader's Corner, so I should include something on where you can read more about computer genealogy. THE GENEALOGICAL HELPER includes a COMPUTER HELPER section in every issue. Articles are usually submitted by readers and paid advertisements for all sorts of genealogical software abound, but this is a good place for the computer genealogy novice to "get his feet wet".

Donna Przecha & Joan Lowrey have written a GUIDE TO SELECTING GENEALOGICAL SOFTWARE. It is available from Donna Przecha at P.O. Box 29515, San Diego, CA 92129, for \$14.95 + \$1./50 S&H. They review 36 programs for the genealogists.

For PAF users, Joan Lowrey has written a PAF 2.2 USERS' GUIDE for the beginner and the experienced. For \$14.95 + \$1.50 S&H you can get the book from her at 7371 Rue Michael, La Jolla, CA 92037, (619) 454-7046.

I hope you find some of the above information helpful. The PC is a very useful tool to the genealogist. I know it has been a great help to me. I began doing genealogy only a few years ago and using the computer only a few months ago, so I am not an "expert" at either one. I just try to share what little I do know with our readers.

USING A PERSONAL COMPUTER for GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH by Steph Valentine

I've been often asked why use a personal computer? Besides using it for word processing, financial programs, work and games, I also use it to assist me in my genealogical hobby. There are two aspects of using a personal computer in genealogy -- first I use a genealogical program, Personal Ancestral File (PAF), by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints as a genealogical management system. I use it to maintain my genealogical records. It consists of several unique programs:

FAMILY RECORDS is a database of my pedigree allowing me to enter, within the constraints of the program, selective data on my ancestors. It also allows me to print out the data in numerous ways and to look for inconsistencies within that data

RESEARCH DATA FILER allows me to maintain large amounts of original research data. It helps me organize my research data so that I can analyze it more effectively.

GENEALOGICAL INFORMATION EXCHANGE allows me to extract data from my Family Records database for exchange with a fellow researcher and visa versa. It is the standard for data exchange between other genealogical software programs.

This is not to say that PAF is the best genealogical software program. Many others will accomplish the same goal. Roots III, Family Roots, Brothers Keeper, and Family Ties are a few of the many programs that exist to help the genealogists. I use PAF for two reasons: It is sponsored by the Latter-day Saints and it is inexpensive (\$35).

My second use of the personal computer in genealogy is using it to connect with fellow researchers through Electronic Bulletin Boards (BBS). There is a network of people spread across most of the free world exchanging genealogical (and other) information by computer and telephone lines. Several commercial networks provide genealogical areas, i.e., CompuServe, Genie and Prodigy. They cost for the time you are logged on to them but they provide answers that are well worth the cost.

There is also a volunteer organization called FIDONET. It consists of thousands of BBSs world-wide who pass information between themselves on a number of topics. These topics have been organized into Conferences, of which there are several pertaining to Genealogy. The messages are passed or "echoed" from BBS to BBS and can eventually reach as far as Australia, South Africa or Europe. Replies can take several weeks to wend their way back. I have seen messages from California, Ohio, Virginia, Texas and England to name a few.

The genealogy conferences available are:

GENEALOGY: a general echo for exchange of information

JEWISHGEN: for researchers of Jewish genealogy

SC GENEALOGY: primarily for those interested in the South Eastern USA

GENSOFT: covers genealogy software

GENEALOGY EUROPE: connects to genealogists in and interested in Europe

AUS GENEALOGY: connects to genealogists in and interested in Australia

GENEALOGY WGW: covers submissions and queries to the Who's Got What Database, a system for sharing the locations of private reference material.

If you have a modem, it is simple to get involved in these echoes. Use your modem to dial into a local BBS and register as a new member. Some BBSs require time to verify who you are and may not allow you full access for a few days; some charge a fee for their service. Most BBSs will have a Message section and a File section. Enter messages and get a feel for the type of queries and information being passed. Some of the conferences, particularly GENEALO-GY have a great many messages; you may have to log on daily as many BBSs do not have the capacity to hold the messages for long.

Then write your own message and wait for a reply. To save time you can write and edit message in advance; then unload it to the board. Replies take time and you may never get a response. Or you may be lucky and find a distant cousin who has just traced your line back to the dawn of history.

Unfortunately for those of us who live in Pittsburgh, there are several FIDO electronic bulletin boards, but none, as of now, carry any of the Genealogical conferences. But don't get discouraged. Most system operators (Sysop) are receptive to requests for new echoes and may be willing to bring them in. If you are already on a Fidonet board, leave a message for your Sysop and get him on line. Let your genealogical friends know his number and have them log on, too.

So why not give it a try. Dial a number and get your query zipping down the wires. Good luck and maybe I'll be talking to you!

BOOK FOR SALE THROUGH SOCIETY

The North Hills Genealogists are now taking your orders for "The Pennsylvania Line: A Catalog/Research Guide to Pennsylvania Genealogy and Local History", published by the Southwestern Pennsylvania Genealogical Services. - Research aids including alternative records available and where to find them for Birth, Marriage, and Death Records in PA.
- 67 County courthouses giving current hours of operation, photocopy costs, formation date, parent counties, etc.
- 6. 40 page listing of 9,000 villages, towns, and railroad stops in existence in 1900 giving population figures, as well as county and township in which they are (or were) located.

- Alphabetical listing of PA's 1,500 townships giving county in which they are located; year formed; and township from which they were created.
- Special section on 1,600 items available on microfilm, 900 maps to aid in your research; 300 family genealogies; plus MUCH MORE!

SPOTLIGHT-FRANKLIN PARK

HISTORY OF FANKLIN PARK (derived from "History of Franklin Park Borough, October, 1976, by the Franklin Park Borough History Commission)

In 1788 Allegheny County was formed from Washington and Westmoreland Counties. At that time the entire North Hills area encompassed what was then Pitt township. In 1796 Pitt township was divided into Pine and Deer townships. In 1803 Ohio township was formed from part of Deer township and in 1823 Franklin township was created from part of Ohio township. In 1863 part of Franklin township split off to become Marshall township. In 1961 Franklin township became Franklin Park Borough, the current legal name of Franklin Park.

Among the earliest inhabitants of this area were the Monongahela Indians and later the Delaware Indians, members of the Iroquois federation. The latter were present when the first white men came into Franklin Park.

The Revolutionary War had a major impact upon who the first owners and settlers of this area were. During the war, as the value of Continental money decreased precipitously, the Pennsylvania General Assembly issued certificates to soldiers to make adjustment for the depreciation of the script (money) they were issued as pay.

Later the General Assembly purchased Indian lands to be used to repay or redeem the certificates issued during the war. The land purchased included all of the North Hills, as well as parts of Beaver, Butler, Lawrence, and Armstrong Counties. In total, 720,000 acres were set aside to be auctioned off to Revolutionary soldiers. Legislation was enacted to allow each certificate holder to bid on the available lots, which were intended to vary in size between 200 and 350 acres.

To subdivide the Depreciation Lands, surveyors were hired to lay out individual tracts. In what is now Franklin Park, three men were assigned specific areas to survey. They were: Samuel Nicholson, to survey what now includes east Franklin Park; William Alexander, to survey what is now most of the western half of the current borough; and Nathaniel Breading, whose area included the extreme western portion of the township, including the Hopkins Church Road area, part of Beaver County, and part of Bell Acres Borough. Nicholson Road is roughly in the vicinity of the dividing line between Nicholson's and Alexander's surveying areas.

Surveying was accomplished in 1785. In March, 1786, the surveyed tracts were put up for auction in Philadelphia. Revolutionary soldiers had the option of redeeming certificates issued during the war for cash or to bid on tracts in the Depreciation Lands. Most soldiers chose to receive cash. In Franklin Park, NONE of the tracts were acquired by certificate holders. In fact, all but six of the Franklin Park tracts were purchased by Philadelphians. The remaining six were acquired by Nicholson, the surveyor.

In 1792 laws were enacted to allow anyone to mark out any UNSOLD Depreciation Land tract, clear the land, and live there for at least two years. At the end of the two years he could obtain a patent from the state giving him title to the land. A fee of \$20 would be assessed per one hundred acres. Several original settlers chose this option: William Jones, Thomas Holeman, Jacob Rosensteel, and John Robertson. However, they found that the land they had settled had actually been previously sold to others. Needless to say, there were many disputes in the early years about title to individual tracts.

Most of the tracts surveyed by Nicholson were owned in the earliest years by Thomas Astley. By 1813 seven of the tracts in the area surveyed by Alexander had been settled. During the 1830's twelve of the sixteen tracts surveyed by Nicholson were settled upon.

To make allowances for roads, the Supreme Executive Council, which was responsible for selling the Depreciation Lands, required that all tracts include a six percent allowance of land for roads. The first road evolved from the Kushkushkee Indian Trail. Part of that trail is today part of Brandt School Road.

In the January issue of the newsletter we will publish the names of early owners and settlers of Franklin Park.
