#### WHO WE ARE NORTH HILLS GENEALOGISTS

We are a group of genealogy enthusiasts who meet on a regular basis to assist one another in establishing our family histories. We meet on the third Tuesday of every month, except December, at the Northland Public Library, 300 Cumberland Road, McCandless Township in the North Hills of Pittsburgh, PA. Tip Time begins at 6:45 P.M., and our general meeting commences at 7:00 P.M. Meetings are free and open to the public.

We publish a newsletter ten times a year for a nominal membership fee of \$15.00 annually. The subscription year runs from August to June, but anyone wishing to join the North Hills Genealogists mid-year will receive back issues of the newsletter for that membership year. Previous years' newsletters are also available for purchase, each containing helpful hints for beginners and for experienced genealogists.

The North Hills Genealogists Board meets at 7:00 P.M. on the first Tuesday of each month in the Conference Room of the Northland Public Library. The Board meeting is open to all members of the North Hills Genealogists organization. Consider joining us this year!

#### PRESIDENT'S CORNER

In last month's newsletter I mentioned a rural neighborhood called Wales in Erie County, PA. This is the area where my Williams family ancestors settled when they came to this country in the 1830s, and I committed to elaborating on this in the future. While realizing that the bulk of the NHG readership resides in southwestern Pennsylvania, this is a story that undoubtedly could be put together about many early communities. Besides, there are a number of ties that unite all western Pennsylvanians. Think Steelers!

The neighborhood encompasses portions of four townships in eastern Erie County, roughly encompassing the four corners area of Greene. Greenfield. Harborcreek and Venango Townships. Two creeks help define the area. The headwaters of Sixmile Creek (alternately spelled Six-Mile and Six Mile) are in Greene Township and flow northward into Lake Erie. The southern border of the area is somewhat loosely defined as French Creek, which flows southward to join the Allegheny River at Franklin, PA. Thus, it is a watershed area. draining water that can end up in the northern Atlantic Ocean or the Gulf of Mexico.

The families that settled this area came primarily from the country of Wales, thus giving the settlement its ethnic name. These immigrants bore surnames such as Davis, Evans, Morgan, and Owen and those of my own ancestors - Williams and Jones. Since the Williams and Jones families ended up in Greene Township, I tend to think of that as the heart of the neighborhood of Wales. As mentioned in a previous column, Greene Township originally known Beaverdam Township. It was renamed in late 1840 in honor of the Revolutionary War hero General Nathaniel Greene. Researchers must be careful in checking such things as deeds and tax records (and the 1840 Census) to look under Beaverdam.

The Post Office for this region was known as Boscobel, which is believed to come from the Italian phrase "bosco bella" meaning "in the midst of fair woods". This happened to be the name of a mansion, which played a role in English history. While fleeing for his life near the end of the English Civil War, King Charles II is said to have hidden in an oak tree on the grounds of Boscobel House. How the name got transferred to a post office in Erie County has never been determined. The structure is still standing, although not in use.

The Wales Presbyterian Church, now known as the East Greene Presbyterian Church, was founded in 1849. The original handwritten records of the organizational meeting and subsequent church sessions are still kept in the Church office. Some of the sessions were held entirely in the Welsh language. The Welsh Cemetery, a separately chartered entity, is a large cemetery located to the north and west of the church. Fittingly enough, they are both located on Wales Road

My Williams and Jones relatives settled in farms strung out along a valley formed by the above-mentioned Sixmile Creek. Some of the structures from those farms are still in place, such as the barn of my distant uncle's mentioned in January's column. They provide a very satisfying link to my family's past. Knowing the history of the community of your ancestors can provide a "feel" for them, which can be invaluable.

- \*Title of each proposed presentation;
- \*Brief description of presentation (up to 50 words for the registration booklet);

- \*Audience Level (beginning, intermediate, advanced):
- \*Category (Methodology, Record type, Society management);
- \*Outline or summary of presentation
- \*Audio/visual requirements for proposed presentation (Computer technology is strongly encouraged although FGS does not provide LCD projectors, computers, or live Internet connections.) An overhead projector will be provided if needed.
- \*Brief biography (50 words for the registration booklet, including speaker's name)
- \*Summary of recent speaking experience.

Proposals will be evaluated based upon the speaker's experience, skill, and relevance to the conference themes and audience. **Proposals must be received by 1 May 2009** by e-mail to fgsprogramchair@fgs.org. Each proposal should be sent in a separate individual single PDF or RTF document. Invitations to speak will be issued by October 2009. Speakers will receive compensation according to FGS guidelines.


